### James Cook Museum

### Milbi Wall

Nearly 500 hand-painted and carved tiles adorn the 12 metre long curved Milbi Wall, placed at the very location where in 1770, Captain James Cook and his crew first set foot on land. Don't rush by this sculptural book, take time to enjoy the beautiful art and unravel its stories!

### Guurrbi Tours



### Scenic flights - heli tours from Cooktown

## Rock Art Galleries of Laura

### Mushroom Rock Gallery

This ancient camp has an extensive amount of rock art and hosts a variety of styles from three distinct periods. The oldest is believed to be at least 30,000 years before present. The Mushroom Rock Gallery is easily accessible and only a short walk (100 metres) from the car park.

### Split Rock Gallery

The lure of spectacular earthy sandstone escarpments combined with magical glittering sands will leave you breathless as you approach the Split Rock Aboriginal art sites, a must-do self-guided tour for any art and culture lover.

Situated in Quinkan Country, these rock art galleries, along with others in the Laura area, have been identified as being up to 30,000 years old and are listed by UNESCO as being among the top 10 rare rock art sites in the world.

Though Split Rock Gallery is a self-guided tour, other specialised tours hosted by the Aboriginal Elders are available for booking through the Quinkan & Regional Cultural Centre.

### Sandy Creek Galleries

This site features a great selection of ancient rock art engravings as well as the stunning Yam Dreaming Gallery. As the tour includes a walk of approximately 25 minutes each way, a moderate level of fitness is required.



### Quinkan Galleries

These galleries are acknowledged as being the most highly regarded rock art in the region and are highly significant and sacred to the Aboriginal people of the area. Hence, this is a premium tour and has a strict limit of only 150 people each year that have the privilege of viewing this magnificent and beautiful site.

### Giant Horse Galleries

The Giant Horse Galleries consist of five shelters depicting ancestral spirits and many of the region's animals, important for totemic value and as a food source. This site is one of very few examples in the world where contact with another culture is recorded in pictorial images.



## Historic Laura & Quinkan Country

### Quinkan & Regional Cultural Centre

This fascinating interpretive centre showcases all aspects of Quinkan Country including its Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal heritage and the natural environment. It ranks among Queensland's finest cultural centres, so make this your first stop in Laura for information on the region.

A select range of Aboriginal paintings, arts and crafts are available for sale, and you can book guided tours to some of the world famous rock art sites in the region.

The centre has several interpretive displays with information on the Quinkan rock art galleries, local families and tribal elders, the gold rush days and cattle stations, and offers disabled access and a café.

## Laura Festivals


### Laura Dance Festival

The biennial Laura Aboriginal Dance Festival is the premier celebration of Aboriginal culture in Cape York, enabling the wider community to witness and gain insight into unique Aboriginal story-telling, dance ceremony, song, language and art.

The dance festival ground at Laura is the site of a very old traditional Bora ground and is a respected and sacred site to Aboriginal people. Situated in Quinkan Country, it is nestled amongst some of the oldest and most spectacular rock art in the world.

Known as a 'meeting ground' for the communities of Cape York, the festival is highly regarded by many Aboriginal people as a place where families meet new and old family members and pass on family histories.

Have you ever wondered what Aboriginal rock art really means? For an unforgettable experience join Nugal-warra Elder, Willie Gordon, on one of his award-winning tours to his ancestral rock art sites, high in the hills outside Hope Vale.

Willie's magical tours take you to Wangaar-Wurri, a timeless landscape with giant rocks, sandstone escarpments and spectacular views. Hidden amongst the giant boulders and escarpments are the Nugal rock art sites, where Willie explains the art, its messages and stories, giving you a unique insight into Aboriginal spirituality and society.

This is a mandatory stop for the avid art-lover, and with artists exhibiting who are nationally recognised, it's a great opportunity for investors to add to their collection, or for others to simply appreciate and admire the many art forms. The centre's gallery space showcases a collection of paintings, woven forms, jewellery, printmaking and traditional tools, while in the separate workshop area, visitors are encouraged to talk to each artist to gain a better understanding of what they're producing. Check out the gardens and stay awhile in this lovely relaxing and creative atmosphere, while you share the culture, knowledge and skills of the Gungu Yimithirr people.

## home rule guided walks



Remember, when you are on Aboriginal land that it's no different from you inviting people into your own home. So please, wait to be invited, treat your hosts' country and culture with respect and abide by their wishes.

## Remember the 3 R's...

### Relationship

Recognise Indigenous Aboriginal people's relationship and connection to the land.

### Responsibility

Acknowledge the ongoing responsibility Indigenous Aboriginal people have to their country, and recognise your own responsibility to travel thoughtfully.

### Respect

Respect Aboriginal beliefs associated with country and culture. As a visitor respect the wishes of your hosts and any restrictions that you have been asked to observe.
